
Animal Atlas: Meet the animals of Africa



Running With The Wildebeest In Kenya




Hanging Out With The Fruit Bats Of Zambia

Battling With The Hippos Of Botswana




The Kalahari Desert is in Southern Africa. Once a year, a river floods part of the desert. It turns the dry land into a happy, watery home for many animals.

Swimming With The Sardines Of South Africa




Each year, an amazing event takes place in the ocean. It happens along the coast of South Africa. The event is called the Great Sardine Run.
