Her eyes filled with tears. She talked with family members in Florida and Massachusetts. It was the first time since the hurricane.

All over Puerto Rico, people are looking for a signal. Without signal, cellphones will not work.

Carlos Ocasio picked his way through tree branches and broken glass to find a signal. Eventually, he got some cellphone service. When he did, he called his brother in New Jersey.

"My throat got a little choked up and I couldn't talk for a minute," he said. "They're calling me from everywhere, asking when I'm going to arrive."

The phone problems have been hard for family members of people in Puerto Rico, too. They have had to wait in silence. They have seen Hurricane Maria on the news. Many have not been able to speak to their loved ones.

## Many Cellphone Towers Not Working In San Juan

Most of the cellphone towers in San Juan were not working. Cellphone and Internet companies say they are working on the problems.

Ricardo Rossello is the governor of Puerto Rico. He said a major underwater cable had been repaired. This would let people make long-distance calls again.

Meanwhile, people in Puerto Rico will keep trying to use their phones.

Wanda Nieves went to a Wi-Fi hotspot in San Juan. She was finally able to connect. She spoke to her family in Florida and Michigan.

She said she was relieved. Now, she said, she'll turn her attention to helping the island.
